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Meet Maia Eng, MD,
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The ICU Caring for the Region's Most Acute Patients

Stand inside the doors of St. Helena Hospital's Intensive Care Unit and you quickly realize this is no ordinary ICU. Beyond the windows, REACH air medical helicopters land – bringing in critically ill patients from Napa Valley north to the Oregon border.

The phone rings from area hospitals that rely on this team as an expert, always helpful resource. Meanwhile intensivists support one of the busiest cardiac surgery programs in California, where hundreds of patients with some of the sickest, most complex hearts are helped each year. ICU Medical Director Roderick Fontenette, MD is immensely proud of the care he and his team deliver, and for good reason...



When lives are on the line, the face you want to see is that of Roderick W. Fontenette, MD, Medical Director of St. Helena Hospital's ICU. He's treated wounded servicemembers

on medical airlifts out of Afghanistan and Kuwait, was part of a military team that worked within Community Regional Medical Center in Fresno providing DoD support for COVID-19

patients, and provided humanitarian support for Hurricanes Harvey and Irma as part of the Air Force's Critical Care Air Transport Team (CCATT). Dr. Fontenette is board-certified,

NEXT-GEN CANCER TECH

Earlier Lung Cancer Treatment? It's Here...

Board-certified pulmonologist and critical care specialist Kiran Ubhayakar, MD, is on a mission to turn the tables on California's #1 cancer killer: lung cancer. But he needs your help to do it...

Here's the thing most people don't know about lung cancer. Lung cancers often wait twenty to thirty years to manifest, until patients are in their 60s and 70s. You may have quit smoking decades before. But the risk factors even from prior smoking



remain, and chance for cancer increases. But although lung cancer is the #1 cause of cancer deaths in California and nationwide, research shows only four out of ten Americans are concerned they could even get lung cancer. Just half that number – two out of ten – have talked to their

doctor about risk¹.

It gets tougher yet. When lung cancer cases aren't detected until a late stage, the odds of surviving are only six percent. And California's rate of early diagnosis? That hasn't moved significantly in the last half decade.

Kiran Ubhayakar, MD wants to change all that

Dr. Ubhayakar specializes in lung-related health conditions. In fact, it's the reason he's here. "What drew me to St. Helena Hospital, I've been here about six months now, is the prevalence of pulmonary disease here and in the neighboring areas – all the way up to the Oregon border – and the opportunity to build a lung nodule program that will help people."

Harvard-educated, and he heads up an Intensive Care Team that is second to none. The numbers say it all: after factoring out long-term skilled care facilities, St. Helena Hospital's ICU team stands among the top five in the state for patient acuity level – meaning, severity of illness treated and/or level of care needed.

Standing ready, 24/7

“We have patients that have received care at places like UCSF, Stanford, and UC Davis,” says Dr. Fontenette. His voice is confident and caring. “They know when they enter the doors at St. Helena, they will get that exact same level of care right here. Our nurses are absolutely top notch, we have very skilled respiratory therapists, pulmonologists, it's truly a community within the hospital. I don't have to

transfer you to other places, we can manage it right here because of the resources that we have. We stand ready, and we have all capabilities, 24 hours a day, here if you need us.”

Grateful for your trust

Supporters of St. Helena Hospital Foundation may not be aware what a difference they make when every minute matters in the life of a critically ill patient. But Dr. Roderick Fontenette never forgets. “The reason we're able to deliver the level of care that we do is because we are supported by the Foundation,” he begins. “In fact we're working with the Foundation right now to get two additional devices – the Arctic Sun to help with lifesaving temperature management, and a suite of pupillometers, that can flag increased intracranial pressure



in stroke patients. Having Foundation supporters help us acquire the most up-to-date equipment enables us to save lives and stay at the forefront of delivering world-class care right here in Napa Valley, and I want to thank the community for trusting us with their care.”



“Lung cancer is the leading cause of death in the US today in terms of cancer deaths. Robotic-assisted bronchoscopy is a game-changer which will allow us to diagnose and treat cancers earlier. If you can catch cancers at an earlier stage, such as stage I, you could potentially have an 80% cure rate. This means that we can save a lot of lives,” said Kiran Ubhayakar, MD, board-certified pulmonary and critical care specialist at St. Helena Hospital, of robotic bronchoscopy and the lung nodule program he's hoping to build with generous support like yours. Currently on a six-month demo trial with a state-of-the-art robotic bronchoscopy system you'd normally only find in major academic centers, Dr. Ubhayakar is excited by the life-changing opportunity a formal purchase could present. “Having an accurate biopsy is the name of the

game. There is nothing more important than that. The remarkable thing about robotic-assisted bronchoscopy is that you have direct vision all the way. It's thinner, it's smaller, you can get all the way out to the very edge of the lung – and it doesn't fatigue. Years ago you could

not biopsy the lung nodules below 2 cm accurately. However now with the robotic bronchoscopy system, you can potentially biopsy nodules less than 1 cm extremely accurately. This will translate to a much higher survival rate from this terrible disease.”

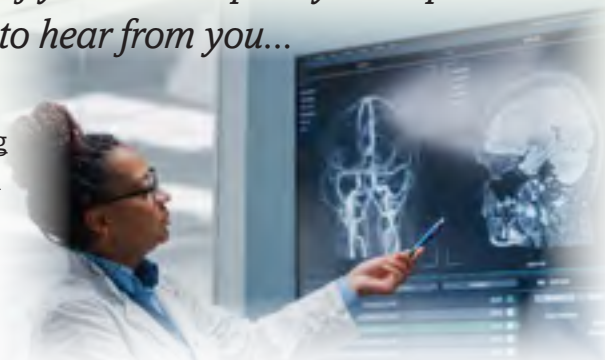
